COMMUNITY SUPPORT DRIVES BOND PROJECT PROGRESS

A Project Update, Thanks to You!

We are pleased to provide the school community with an update on the significant progress being made across our various bond projects, highlighting our commitment to enhancing our learning environments. Work on campus traffic flow for the high school and middle school bus loop and parent pick-up/drop off includes considerable planning for the redesign of the traffic flow in and around the middle and high school buildings. Based on observation and feedback, we feel we have the best plan possible to address safety and flow concerns: Fully separate buses from carpool and staff traffic at both the middle and high schools; reconfiguration of carpool traffic routes at both the middle and high schools; additional parking in front of middle and high schools; Addition of a 'thru' drive east to west for bus traffic to move within our district, and an open Holler Lane to all traffic coming in or out of the campus allowing for efficient flow.

With regard to design for the middle and high school renovations, the design team has been collaborating with key staff to gather input on a variety of upcoming projects, including renovations of old middle and high school science rooms, renovation/expansion of existing high school weight room, and renovation of existing high school girls' and boys' locker rooms.





Significant work has transpired on athletic fields. The upcoming improvement project for the baseball and softball fields will focus on enhancing safety, accessibility, and overall field quality. The project includes the installation of new fencing and backstops for both fields to match the updated fencing planned for the football stadium. Emergency vehicle access points will also be added to both fields. Upgrades will include new irrigation systems and a modernized controller for better zone management. Since the bladder tanks were replaced two years ago, they will remain in place. On the baseball field, the infield will be resodded and the area between third base and home plate will be leveled. Both outfields are currently in good condition and do not require regrading or reseeding. Additional improvements include the installation of new foul line markers on both fields and cement pads in front of each dugout, extending from the dugout entrances to the safety fences.

Continued Cover Story

Thanks to the generous support of our community through the 2024 School Construction Bond, much of the middle school and high school will be receiving brand-new student and staff furniture! The existing furniture is over 25 years old, and the new selections will usher in updated, modern environments for both students and staff, fostering a more comfortable and engaging learning experience. Staff and administration from the middle and high schools visited the VS America showroom in Grand Rapids, MI, to begin planning a fall furniture pilot. The visit offered an opportunity to explore flexible, modern furniture solutions that support student-centered learning environments. The team also met with representatives from Custer Office. VS America and Custer Furniture were selected as suppliers, with VS providing classroom furniture and Custer handling office furnishings. These visits represent an important step in selecting furniture that aligns with the district's instructional goals.

If you are in the area, you will see that much stadium work has The track grading has been fully completed and transpired! successfully passed all required testing, marking a key milestone. Work began on installing the storm drainage system around the field, with ongoing efforts to connect the storm line from the depression area to the field-currently paused at the intersection with existing fiber lines. The southern depression area itself is nearing completion, and crews have also started placing rebar and framing for the retaining wall, setting the stage for the next phase of construction. Other progress includes sending out Change Order 03 for the new scoreboard, pouring the bleacher foundations, starting the interior trench drain installation, closing two track sections, and installing fence panels and gravel for the Fire Chief. For next week, anticipated work includes continuing trench drain installation, pouring the concrete curb for it, grading all field event areas, preparing the north start area (excluding fiber work), installing fence posts, and removing the existing scoreboard. Additionally, fiber work and the installation of leaching basins, storm systems, and gravel are underway.

Work is underway for a substantial upgrade from our current board, which will be repurposed to the new multi-purpose field south of the stadium. The scoreboard will be moved to the North endzone, to make way for upcoming renovations to the southern entrance in a later bid package.

Progress on the high school fire alarm project includes the completion of high-ceiling work in the gym and the installation of new booster panels, with all wiring pulled and connected. The P-Link connections between panels are now complete, and the remaining devices for the building have been successfully delivered. Installation of SLC loops on the first floor, pulling wire into new boxes in the auditorium for new devices, and installing new horn and strobe devices in second-floor classrooms, hallways, and the cafeteria. Work also began on installing horns and strobes in first-floor classrooms.

Stay tuned for our bond progress. Promises made, promises kept!

This year, our school implemented Acadience Reading, and its impact has been immediate and significant. As an assessment tool designed specifically for students in kindergarten through fifth grade, Acadience has enabled us to take a more critical and data-informed look at early literacy development. Its insights have helped us refine instruction, tailor interventions, and ensure that no child falls through the cracks during these crucial early years. In short, it helps us intervene before small issues become larger obstacles to academic success. One of the most valuable aspects of implementing Acadience has been its ability to guide instructional next steps. The data collected has helped teachers identify specific skill gaps and adjust their instruction accordingly. It's not just about identifying students who are behind-it's about knowing how to help them catch up and where to focus our efforts. The clarity and consistency of the data have contributed to shaping our building-wide model for intervention. Acadience has not only helped in identifying students who need support but has also united our staff around a shared understanding of student needs and instructional priorities.

9th Annual MMS Hometown Hero Ceremony MATTAWAN'S YOUTH SALUTES ITS HEROES

In May, the atmosphere in the James Weeldreyer Auditorium was charged with authentic inspiration and admiration as the 8th grade students of MMS gathered to honor the unsung heroes of their community. This year marked the 9th Annual MMS Hometown Hero Ceremony, a heartfelt tradition where we recognize two outstanding individuals whose everyday actions make a positive impact on the lives around them. This year our final winners were Andy Anderson, honored by Team 8-1 eighth grader Olivia Wagner, and Brandi Smith, honored by Team 8-2 eighth grader Bradley Clark.

The ceremony was the culmination of a profound journey for the students, who embarked on a project to identify and celebrate true heroes within their community. Each student selected someone who embodied the essence of heroism—someone who selflessly contributes to the well-being of others. Through this project, students wrote essays providing three compelling reasons why their chosen person deserved the title of Hometown Hero. They drafted thoughtful interview questions, arranged meetings, and captured their subjects' stories to create moving video documentaries out of their original essays.

This project was more than an academic exercise; it was an authentic experience that opened students' eyes to the countless ways they could embody heroism in their everyday lives. It encouraged them to look beyond traditional notions of heroism and recognize the quiet, yet profound, impact of those around them. The students learned to view their family members, friends, neighbors, and community members through a new lens, understanding that heroism can be moments of monumental courage, but it also lies in small acts of kindness and unwavering support.

Almost 280 individuals were nominated, each with their own unique story of courage and compassion. As students shared their video documentaries, it was evident that while the definitions of a hero may vary, the core values remain the same. Heroes are those who put others before themselves, offer a helping hand when needed, and strive to do their best in all endeavors. Every single class was inspired by one another and the documentaries they created. Students voted on the most inspirational documentary, and those projects became our finalists. They then watched the finalists and voted for one hero that spoke to their hearts the most. For Team 8-1 that was Andy Anderson (project by Olivia Wagner), a firefighter who went through heartbreaking adversity, but that experience inspired him to continually find ways to help others. For Team 8-2, the winner was Brandi Smith (project by Bradley Clark), a local mom who lost her eldest son, Tucker (one of this eighth grade class' own classmates), to childhood cancer. That heart-wrenching experience drove Brandi to fight for other kids battling, raising funds for research, and to find ways to support our youth as a coach. She takes Tucker with her everywhere, drawing from his loving and kind spirit to propel her to make this world a better place.

As the ceremony concluded, it was evident that the 8th grade class had emerged with a renewed perspective. They now understood the profound impact of recognizing and celebrating the everyday heroes among us, and they were inspired to carry this spirit of heroism forward in their own lives. Neither one of the heroes thought they were deserving of any recognition, but that in and of itself speaks of their selflessness. The MMS Hometown Hero Ceremony was not just an event; it was a celebration of the power of community and the extraordinary potential within each of us to make a difference. COMMENCEMENT 2025 Celebrating a Strong Finish


