### RECOGNIZING EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

MPEF Grant Recipients Bring Innovative Ideas to Life in the Classroom

The Mattawan Public Education Foundation began the school year strong with two events highlighting some of the wonderful work being conducted in the district: the awarding of Brainstrong grants, and a Donor Appreciation Open House at the Mattawan Middle School Media Center. Since our inception, The Foundation has awarded over \$300,000 in Brainstrong grants to teachers and staff in the school district. On October 13 we added to that number, awarding \$23,000 and over 40 grants across all five buildings. That money goes directly into classrooms, helping provide teachers with the ability to enhance the learning environment of our students in creative ways. Brainstrong award day is one of The Foundation's favorite days of the year, as we get to see the impact made as teachers realize they've been awarded a grant they can use to improve the quality of their students' education.

On October 24, The Foundation held a Donor Appreciation Open House to showcase the transformation of the Middle School Media Center. Over the course of the past year, The Foundation engaged in a capital campaign to raise funds to give the media center much needed updates. Through the generosity of donors across the community, we were able to raise over \$100,000, providing the media center with new bookshelves, furnishings, and A/V equipment to create an accessible space for students and media center specialists to interact. The media center is truly the "Heart of the Middle School," and The Foundation thanks everyone who contributed to achieving this goal.



Our Mattawan Marching Band presented its 2023 show Duality at home football games, area competitions and culminated their season by performing at Disney World in Orlando, Florida. "I am so proud. I'm always proud of the band, but today feels different. Over the last few days, we've taken a huge part of the HS band to Florida" said Bill Boswell. Throughout the trip, the students received compliment after compliment about how they behaved and treated people. The flight attendant on our departing flight (which departed 40 minutes early because the students were so efficient) came on the radio to compliment the band on their behavior as we taxied to the gate. At Hollywood Studios, a Disney cast member approached some chaperones to compliment the students on their politeness, contrasting their behavior with another band's students in the park. This theme repeated again and again, including at checkout when the front desk of the hotel, as well as the night security told our tour directors that we were one of the cleanest, quietest, and best behaved groups in memory. This is a reflection not only of the traveling students, but of the way the band as a whole, all of them, work to treat each other and the community around them well. Not every moment is perfect, of course; there were logistical hiccups and sometimes behavior corrections were needed, but when I look at the trip as a whole, I continue to be impressed by this group's willingness to consistently live up to or surpass expectations. I could not be more proud. This was an amazing opportunity for students to grow through meaningful moments. So many students came out of their shell with new connections, deepened older friendships and navigated challenging social dynamics, all while sticking to the "groups of 3 or more" rule. Mr. Boswell was pleased to report that, "as important as the musical growth is, I think my favorite part of the trip is seeing this interpersonal growth."
